**From the Pastor continued**

We have begun our Lenten season and I hope you join us for the monologues of the artisans of the crucifixion. We journey with people who took journeys with their insight into the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. As we are on the road through lent to Easter I offer that instead of giving something up for Lent that you consider taking action during your time of reflection on this journey.

It is easy to love family and friends and neighbors that you care for and agree with but what of those you don't like or agree with. Not only is it difficult to love but what about praying for your enemies. When was the last time you sincerely lifted up your enemy in prayer. Thanking God for them and asking God to surround them with love and grace.

I was listening to a story of a parishioner of how she felt she could not forgive the person who murdered her sister. Everyone listening to her story understood her anger and her struggle. No one offered anything but soon the woman said I know I have difficulty in forgiving, but I do believe that Jesus died for all and forgives all. As she left the safety of our group I know each of us lifted her and her family in prayer that Jesus would be with her in the struggle.

Each of us have stories of how we struggle with forgiveness and love of those we deem unlovable. Yet, can we take the step of praying for those who we find unloveable and unforgivable? Can we allow Jesus to take our struggles and to take away our judgement? As in all living our faith we need to practice. Practice praying for your enemy. Practicing asking God to love the unloveable and to open your heart to love. Ask God to help and change your hardened heart. To change anger and hate to love and grace And knowing the struggle we have loving our enemies we ask God to change all those hearts that are hardened.

Join us for our journey through Lent. I pray for a meaningful and hopeful journey on the road.

## NAZARETH LUTHERAN CHURCH PLANNING RETREAT SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 2026

Nazareth Lutheran Church Council meeting was called to order at 12:02 PM by President Mark Lewis following a potluck fellowship. Present for the meeting were Mark Lewis, Vince Tomlinson, Lisa Smith, Dave Lewis, Nathan Hovland, Arlys Peterson, John Egeland, Joyce Allen, Pastor Marcia, and Church Administrator Eileen Lewis. (All council members were in attendance!) Members dined on potato/rice soup, chili and cornbread, ham and cheese sliders, veggies, and a very tasty Bailey's dessert. Minutes from the December meeting were approved as read by Eileen Lewis, with the correction that Zoey was not present.

**FINANCE REPORT:** General Fund is well in the green thanks to a very generous donation of \$5,500. Lisa was going to transfer \$10K into the Mission Investment Fund in January for its better interest rates, but will this month. Eileen wanted to make sure enough was left in the General Fund to lay more gravel to fill in the holes in the parking lot. Opening balance of \$25,598.03 added \$10,618.00, disbursements totaled \$5,699.93, leaving a very nice balance of \$30,516.10. Savings sits at \$1,630.68; Capital Improvement's balance is \$1,209.13; Mission Investment totaled \$20,113.41; Missions' \$1,148.98. SCRIP opened with a balance of \$2,665.05. Deposited to it was \$900, disbursements came to \$875, leaving a balance of \$2,690.05. Some of the deposited funds were from can and bottle redemptions which will need to go towards after school snacks.

**PASTOR'S REPORT:** Pastor Marcia has enjoyed the children's sermons, and is looking forward to Lent. Confirmation classes have been on hold the last couple weeks, but has picked back up. Mava has written her statement of faith, and did a great job. She'll be sharing it on Confirmation Sunday. Pastoral care has been going well with phone call check ins. She's been fighting a cold but started working on Silent Auction donations. She's also been meeting with colleagues, discussing things happening in the world lately.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS:

**PROPERTY:** Eileen suggested placing a sidewalk and step at the NE door – aka the weekday door. It gets very muddy there, and slippery in the winter. Joyce suggested a railing as well. It was also suggested this be done by a professional to make sure it's done properly. Nathan said he would talk to his son-in-law who does that sort of work. In addition, the smoke alarms haven't been replaced in the parsonage yet, which John said he will absolutely get done ASAP.

**CHRISTIAN ED:** During Lent, monologues will be presented on Artisans of the Crucifixion

the tanner who made the whip; the basket maker who crafted the crown of thorns; the blacksmith who forged the nails that went through Jesus' hands and feet; the carpenter who carved the cross, and the stone mason who chiseled the tomb. The stories will be reiterated during the children's sermon. The Passion Story will also be presented to the children. Bible study and adult Sunday school are doing well. Eileen suggested a book for Pastor Marcia for a teaching tool, entitled "Systemic Theology for Kids." Books are also available for teens and adults.

**STEWARDSHIP:** Still very much in the green!

**INREACH/OUTREACH:** Funds are still available for the snack program but grants are only available every two years. Extra meals will be given out for spring and winter breaks, which will be tuna noodle casserole ingredients for spring, and spaghetti for Christmas. Discussion then turned to the summer meal program. It was suggested by some parents that meals be distributed in the evening as most parents work and are unable to pick up the meals during the day. Eileen talked with members of the Methodist Church in Huxley about availability of space during the late afternoon.

**MUSIC AND WORSHIP:** Hymns chosen through May. Pastor Marcia is working on special music during Lent. Chorus will sing on March 8, and Laurie Hazel is presenting one of the monologues. Her nephew sings and plays guitar and hopefully will share his gift with us.

**OLD BUSINESS:** Nothing to report

**NEW BUSINESS:** Eileen ordered eight Easter lilies from Goode Greenhouses at \$13.00 each, for anyone interested in purchasing one. Discussion then turned to fund raising ideas to replace dinner theatre that won't happen this year. One idea was a 50/50 raffle. Raffle tickets are purchased (amount yet to be determined) and the winning ticket holder gets 50% of the funds collected. Another idea was setting up a booth at the bike trail and serving sandwiches, snacks, and drinks to bikers. It would be during lunch time, and maybe once a month, starting in May. The sandwiches could either be made by parishioners or ordered from Logsdons in Maxwell. Next order of New Business concerned silent auction ideas. It's getting hard to find donors, so it was suggested we may need to do some bargaining. One suggestion was to buy a hotel package from a casino if they would chip in something. We could purchase baseball or football tickets and see if a nearby hotel would offer a free night. Eileen will contact a travel agent in Huxley for possible hotel/destination deals.

Lenten Prayers to start each day.

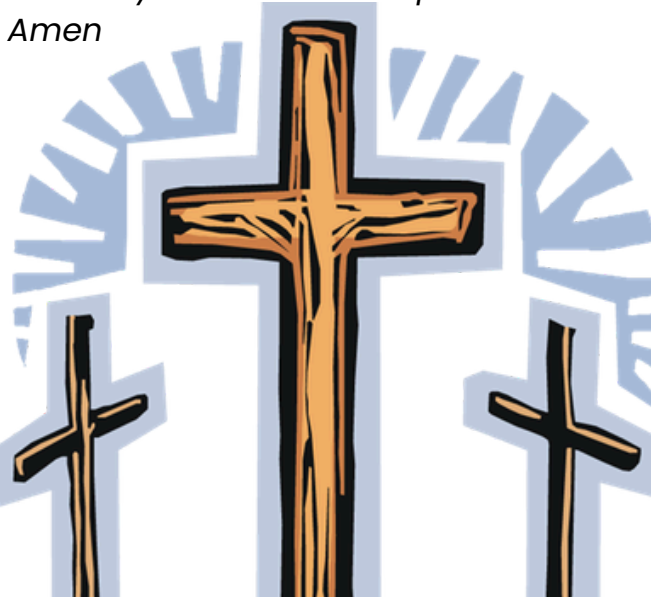

The history of St. Patrick's Day dates back more than 1,000 years and honors Ireland's patron saint, Saint Patrick. The holiday is celebrated annually on March 17, the anniversary of his death in the fifth century. In 2026, St. Patrick's Day will be celebrated on Tuesday, March 17. The Irish have observed this day as a religious holiday for over 1,000 years.



Saint Patrick, who lived in the fifth century, is celebrated as the patron saint of Ireland and its national apostle. Born in Roman Britain, he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. After escaping, he eventually returned and is credited with introducing Christianity to the Irish people. Over the centuries following his death, believed to be on March 17, 493, stories about his life became deeply woven into Irish culture. One of the most famous legends tells of him explaining the Holy Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—using the three leaves of a shamrock.

Since the ninth or 10th century, people in Ireland have celebrated a Roman Catholic feast day honoring St. Patrick on March 17. Interestingly, the first St. Patrick's Day parade didn't happen in Ireland but in America. Records show one was held on March 17, 1601, in the Spanish colony of St. Augustine, Florida, organized by the colony's Irish vicar, Ricardo Artur, along with a celebration the year before. Over a century later, on March 17, 1762, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the British military marched in New York City to honor their patron saint. From there, enthusiasm for St. Patrick's Day parades only continued to grow. It is believed that there are more than 100 St. Patrick's Day parades are held across the United States; New York City and Boston are home to the largest celebrations."

Today, the New York City parade is the world's oldest civilian parade and the largest in the United States, with over 150,000 participants. Each year, nearly 3 million people line the 1.75-mile parade route to watch the procession, which takes more than five hours. Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia and Savannah also celebrate the day with parades involving between 10,000 and 20,000 participants each. In 2020, the New York City parade was one of the first major city events to be canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic; it was replaced by a low-profile ceremonial march in 2021. The parade in New York and others around the country returned in 2022.
